JOHN BENNETT's first contact with amaleur drama was with the Kings Langley Children's Theatre - aged 11 (modesty forbids mention of the actual year). 




of the society, he took the plunge (pun intended, on this occasion) and has enjoyed every minute. He hopes you will share his enjoyment too.



The Lake District ...





wettest inhabited place in England at Seathwaite with an annual rainfall of 3552mm. Bassenthwaite is the only one official "lake" - all the others are "meres" or "waters".

An inspiration to many, including Wordsworth and John Ruskin. The Lake District is currently engaged on a project to gain recognition as a World Heritage Site.

Derwentwater

Derventivater is one of the principal bodies of water in the Lake District and bides immediately south of the town of Keswick. It is approximately 3 miles long, 1 mile wide and 72 feet deep. A regular passenger launch (Ed: without a disco) operates on the lake taking passengers between vanous landing stages.

The Earl of Derwentwater title was created in 1688 though it was forelied in 1716 after the 3rd Earl was beheaded lollowing his part in the 1715 Jacobie Rebellion Despite this, the Earldom continued to be used, as if it had not been forfeited, by the Jacobie heirs. The male line died out in 1814, and the title has not been used since.



Rampsholme Island



At roughly two hundred feet long by a hundred feet wide, Rampsholme is the smallest of the four main islands on Derwentwater. It formed part of the Earl of Derwentwater's formed part of the Earl of Derwentwater's confiscated estate and is called "gartic sland" by the locals due to the abundance of wild gartic. At certain times of the year you can smell the gartic as you go past the island on the boat trips around Derwentwater.

It is also a Cormorant roost throughout the year as well as being home to Mergansers, Goosanders and Oystercatchers among many others (Ed: so Roy tells us.)
